Meet the challenge and you will achieve the Owl Award and win a prize.

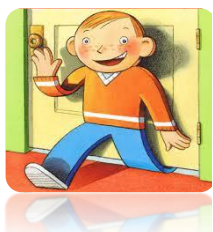
What is a classic novel?

Choose seven of these timeless stories to enjoy by yourself or with an adult.



- Peter Pan by J.M Barrie
- Where the Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak
 - Winnie the Pooh by A.A. Milne
 - The Velveteen Rabbit by Margery Williams
 - Harriet the Spy by Louise Fitzhugh
- The Tale of Peter Rabbit by Beatrix Potter (or any of her other stories)
 - The Snowy Day by Ezra Jack Keats
- A fairy-tale by Hans Christian Andersen, for example; The Snow Queen, The Ugly Duckling, The Little Mermaid
- Make Way for Ducklings by Robert McCloskey
- The Tiger Who Came to Tea by Judith Kerr
 - The BFG by Roald Dahl
- Sylvester and the Magic Pebble by William Steig
 - Green Eggs and Ham by Dr Seuss
 - The Enchanted Wood by Enid Blyton
 - A Bear Called Paddington by Michael Bond
 - Tales from Moominvalley by Tove Jansson
- Clever Polly and the Stupid Wolf by Catherine Storr
- The Adventures of Mrs Pepperpot by Alf Proysen
 - Flat Stanley by Jeff Brown
- My Naughty Little Sister by Dorothy Edwards
